Habits of Successful Photographers

You alone get to define what "success" means in terms of your photography. Are you successful if you find a unique way to photograph an iconic landmark? Are you a professional who measures success by the satisfaction of clients and a positive bottom line in your spreadsheet? Are you a beginner who feels successful in mastering Manual mode? Any of these scenarios can be a measure of success, so skim the metrics below to see if you are hitting your personal goals.

- 1. Be ready to learn. No matter where you are in your photography journey, there is always something new to understand or master. Approach this hobby with an open mind.
- 2. Know your equipment. Dig into the manual. Experiment with different settings and options.
- 3. Practice. Practice, practice, practice. Planning a hike to photograph birds? Before the day comes, practice shooting photos of your backyard visitors. Going on a trip and planning to catch the sunrise while on vacation? Get up early and take some shots close to home.
- 4. Learn to use productivity tools. No matter how good we are, chances are that you'll have to finetune your photos when you get home using post-processing software. There are many good options available, and most will offer short-term free trials so you can find the program that works best for you.
- 5. Look for inspiration. Join a camera club (see what I did there?) Follow a photography blog or Instagram site. Look through the website of places you want to visit.
- 6. Seek out and accept feedback. While photography is an art, and not everyone sees artistic work the same way, asking for and receiving feedback can help you improve your skills.
- 7. Back up your photos. There are plenty of options to complete this essential task. Back up to Google Photos, OneDrive, iCloud, Backblaze, CrashPlan, or just to a second hard drive. Automate the task with simple backup software. I use Ashampoo Pro to back up to an external hard drive.


Submitting Files for the Web Site?

Our President, Mark Hanna, manages the Club web site. To help him keep submitted photos organized and the file sizes small, he has asked that members follow certain file naming and file size conventions. Here's what you need to know.

Bring files to the monthly meeting, on a flash drive labeled with your name. Mark will keep the drive and return it at the following meeting, so you'll want to have two drives available.

Name your files as follows: **Meeting-Your First Name-01**, **Meeting-Your First Name-02**, etc. If you want to add additional characters following the number, such as a description of the image, please keep the total number of characters (including the name and number) to about 30.

Resize your images to be 700 px on the longest side. You can do this in Windows Photos. Open the photo in Photos. Click on the 3-dot menu, choose Resize image, and enter a dimension of 700 px on the long side. The short side will resize automatically.



You can also resize Images in either Photoshop Elements or Photoshop, or in a native Mac application. Hit up Google for specific instructions.

Mark keeps a separate section for photos from Club outings. To submit those, please use the same naming conventions as described above, substituting the word Outing for Meeting.
