

Incorporating Curves into your Photography

One of the challenge words for May is Bend, which might lead you to think about curves and curving lines. Curves "establish spatial continuity, manage the gaze, call for further action, and stir emotion" (skylum). Curves are visually compelling; we can't help but follow the curve with our eyes. Whether you seek out C-curves or S-curves, architectural curves or those found in nature, incorporating curves can help you compose interesting images.

Curves can physically exist (think a road, path, or river), or be implied. If we see a shape where part of the curve is "missing", our brains fill in the gaps.

Both C-curves and S-curves are interesting, but S-curves, being longer, will engage the viewer for a longer period of time. It simply takes longer to follow the curve to its terminus.

Changing your viewpoint can influence the strength of a curve in your photo. Getting up a little higher will show more of the curve. Positioning yourself so the curve flows diagonally or vertically will create more visual energy than a curve photographed horizontally.

If you are near water and have the opportunity, photograph both the curve and its reflection to create circular patterns in your image.

A final tip is to place a subject at the far end of a curve. This gives the viewer's eye a "final destination" as it follows the curve.

Photographing curves can be fun and challenging. Watch for curves and bends for your next photographs, and be sure to share them with the club.

Photoshop Shortcuts

Many photographers use Adobe Photoshop, or Photoshop Elements, to process their photos. Below are a few keyboard shortcuts you might want to commit to memory, to speed your workflow.

CTRL/CMD Z – Undo the last action CTRL/CMD D – Deselect a selected area [(left square bracket) – Decrease brush size] (right square bracket) – Increase brush size CTRL/CMD S – Save CTRL/CMD 0 (zero) – refit the image to the window CTRL/CMD T – activate free transform CTRL ALT SHIFT S / CMD/OPTION/SHIFT S Save for Web (select options; output maximized for

web posting – small file size)

Carrying your camera

Small point & shoot cameras can fit into your pocket. Bridge cameras, or those with smaller lenses, can often be comfortably carried using the provided neck strap. Longer lenses, or those with added battery grips, can quickly become heavy and uncomfortable using just a neck strap. If you are considering a harness or a 3rd-party strap system that is designed for sling or holster use, here are a couple of links that might help with your research.


